IT'S A NEW DAWN, IT'S A NEW DAY, IT'S A NEW LIFE,

BRITISH SKI AND SNOWBOARD IS FEELING GOOD

Formed by The British Olympic Association in February 2010, after the previous Governing organisation ran into serious financial difficulties, British Ski and Snowboard (BSS), the National Governing Body for Skiing and Snowboarding in the United Kingdom, is looking and feeling good ahead of its first full winter season.

Not only did BSS announce this week that it has retained two of its major sponsors (British Land and Colmar), selected the French Alpine resort of Méribel to host the 2011 British Alpine Skiing Championships (27th March to 4th April 2011), launched a new website www.teambss.org.uk and opened an Official Twitter account: @TeamBSS, but it also revealed, most significantly, that it has set itself a host of ambitious goals in an aim to achieving Olympic medal success on the slopes:

- British skiers and riders on the podiums at world events in the next four to eight years
- Challenging for medals at the 2014 Winter Olympic Games in Sochi
- Achieving medal success at the Winter Olympic Games by 2018

However, it is the goals off the slopes which are providing BSS with its toughest challenge. BSS is struggling to raise the money necessary to provide the training and development programmes required by the small number of elite British Athletes. BSS Chief Executive, Dave Edwards, comments: "Government and lottery funding for the sport is very small indeed, so any cuts resulting from public spending cuts could pose significant problems in attaining Olympic medal success. Whilst not on the levels of Football, Rugby or Cricket, snowsports are enormously popular in the UK and fully deserving of Government funding; throughout the winter months."

And it is within this popularity that Edwards sees as an untapped resource. With a reported 1.12 million Brits taking part in snowsports each year, Edwards believes that millions of British pounds are being spent funding overseas Olympic teams: "When Brits spend money on hotels or lessons overseas, it is indirectly helping other nations achieve Olympic success. One of our focuses is to come up with a solution that sees the money being spent by British skiers and boarders help fund British athletes."

In an effort to get the British skiing and snowboarding public involved BSS has launched a new membership initiative that costs just £3 per annum. Members will get the chance to get closer to the action with opportunities to train with the Team GB professionals.

- Check your levels of anti-freeze
- Make sure battery is in good condition
- Always use a de-icer on windows, or a scraper NEVER use hot water
- Check that the screen wash is not clogged and that the bottle is topped up for use, and make sure that an additive is used to stop it freezing
- Check windscreen wipers for wear and replace them if necessary
- make sure that all heaters and ventilation systems are working so that misting is minimised
- Tyre tread depth should be at least 1.6 mm across the central three-quarters of the breadth of the tread and around the entire circumference, and there should be no cuts or cracks

Speaking with him the other day, he said, "I feel really good at the moment".

Training for his final season has gone well, "We had very good summer training in Chile, I had just a little problem with my back, but now its feeling good," said Michi.

Starting skiing at a early age he progressed through the ranks of Austrian wannabes to become a World Cup winner in Super G, and his favourite discipline, Downhill, he is still ranked in the top ten skiers in the World today. One of Austria's top stars he also won Silver in the Downhill in the 2006 Winter Olympics in Sestriere. I asked what was the highlight so far? "From the sport side it was the World Championship race in St Moritz and the Downhill title in 2004/05, and for my heart it was my first victory in Kitzbuhel, because it is a special race for all skiers", he said.

What does he feel entering his final year? "I am looking forward to my last season in the World Cup circus", said Michi. One of skiing 's gentlemen, he lives in Altenmarkt with his wife Barbara and their three children.



GLOUCESTER'S FUNPARK REOPENS

Gloucester's funpark was shut over the summer after concerns over the matting. There were doubts and concerns that investment would be forthcoming and that the park would ever be open again, but after securing £60,000 for the makeover the park is back and better than ever.


Pristine new matting has been laid, the jump considerably altered, going bigger and wider and the addition of a box completes the new look. UK SNOWSPORTS MARKET STAYS ABOVE ONE MILLION DESPITE 12% DECLINE

The UK snowsports market fell by 12% across all sectors in 2009/10 according to the Ski Club of Great Britain's annual Snowsports Analysis report. The total UK snowsports market remains above one million, however, reported at 1.12 million people.

The decline in overall numbers can be attributed to reduced capacity by tour operators, the weak pound and a lack of confidence in the economy. The report, however, goes on to discuss returning confidence to the industry with a stronger pound and investments by resorts to attract UK visitors.

France's market share declined by 4% as Austria increased their market share by 2% for the second season in a row. France, however, continues to hold the biggest market share of the UK snowsports market with a 39% share. Other findings from the report include:

- The average cost of a snowsports holiday has risen, going from £686 in 2008/9 to £714.
- Online booking of snowsports holidays increased again, rising 3% year on year.
- Self drive holidays increased by 2% and train travel to the mountains by 1%.
- Visitors to Scottish ski resorts increased across the five ski centres due to excellent snow conditions in 2009/10.

KLAMMER AND KILTS

I recently met Austrian, Franz Klammer at an Austrian Tourist Board event. He was wearing a kilt, which I thought was strange, but optimistic, as it meant that this skiing legend could be partly British. However, he claimed that the kilt originated with the Celts in his home region of Carinthia

Members of the Tourist Board from various regions of Austria gave short speeches, as did Klammer himself. All of them were witty, and maybe charm is part Austria's attraction.

Franz talked briefly about today's racers. Aksel Lund Svindal and Bode Miller were thought to be very much in contention in the World Cup. The best skiers in the world are not currently in Ski Cross and it is important that Austrians win races. This was better than several Austrians being in the top ten, but not necessarily one winning the race.

Franz's role model was the triple Olympic gold medallist, Austrian Toni Sailer, who for many years was responsible for organising the Hahnenkamm downhill race in Kitzbuhel. Thankfully, the artificial final jump on the course, which was responsible for several crashes in recent years was removed at last year's race. The coach who mainly influenced Klammer was Stefen Sodat, who won the downhill in Wengen in the 1960s. One of the high ranking Tourist Board officials said that this was the first time he had met Franz, who had been his hero since the age of seven when he watched Franz winning the Downhill Olympic gold in 1976 in Innsbruck. One generation of winners inspires the next generation.

At the event Franz had just played two over par golf (for non-golfers that's pretty good). Could he end up being a golfing roll model as well?

Thanks to the Austrian Tourist Board for organising this brief encounter with the Kaiser, whose home resort in Carinthia is Bad Kleinkirchheim. Although some of the Austrian resorts are quite low lying, most of them have snow-making facilities and the memories of skiing in this country tend to linger longer. If you are of Celtic origin, you could be a returning to ancestral homelands.





YORKSHIRE CLUB RECOGNISES OLYMPIC ACHIEVEMENT

The Snowsport England Nordic Roller Ski Courses at Hetton Lyons Park, Co.Durham over the August Bank Holiday weekend proved to be an ideal opportunity for the Yorkshire Dales Cross Country Ski Club to mark the achievements of club member Fiona Hughes who represented Great Britain at the Vancouver Olympics this year.

Fiona was presented with an engraved crystal trophy by Yorkshire Dales Club chairman, John Anderson.

Fiona became the first woman Nordic skier to represent Great Britain at the Olympics since 1988, racing in the Women's Individual 10km Free Technique race on the first day of competition at Whistler Olympic Park. She had the race of her life, coming in 68th out of 78 competitors to achieve the sixth best ever performance for GB ladies, in terms of percentage behind the winner (although there are only 2 British ladies that have done better). Coach Roy Young said, 'I have never seen Fiona ski so well in a skate race. She gave that everything and has a great platform to move on from.'

During the winter season, Fiona (now 20) saw her final races in international junior competition, gaining three podium positions at international events and three top twelve positions at Junior Continental Cup races. It was also her last year competing at the World Junior Championships where she achieved best ever results for a British female.


Good results in December and January gained Fiona the qualifying standard for the Olympics and she was also able to make her World Cup debut whilst at the Team GB holding camp in Calgary.

Fiona recognises her years of hard work

have paid off and is now hungry to do more and looking towards Sochi in 2014. Meanwhile she has taken up her place at Cambridge University with international competition carefully timetabled in through the coming season.

The Hetton Lyons course, this year organised by Yorkshire Dales Cross Country Ski Club, is one of four SSE Nordic Ski Courses held throughout the summer on roller skis. One of the GB Roller Ski Series races, the 15km freestyle, was held over the weekend with Fiona Hughes winning the ladies race in a time of 32 minutes and 18 seconds.







CHIC IN MADONNA DI CAMPIGLIO

ast run of the day! I waited until the few people who had also come up on the Fortini chair lift had dispersed. By then the carabinieri had retreated to the cosy warmth of Rifugio Viviani for a drink, gossip and, if any were left, a delicious tiramisu before doing their final sweep of the pistes. At last I was alone at the top of Pradalago the slopes of Madonna di Campiglio spread out below and around me. Across the valley I could see the glistening white snow on the Grosté ski area. A vast pale expanse above the tree line earlier in the day, it had been a mass of brightly clad skiers all enjoying the wide, well groomed runs and the lovely powdery snow. Music had echoed around the peaks from Ristorante Boch, the mid-station restaurant and people had been dancing on the tables. Rarely could I resist a little jig on my skis when passing this lively spot but for rest and refreshment I preferred the quieter, more elegant Ristorante Stoppani at the very top of the Grosté cabin lift

Just to the right of Grosté the white stripes that are the runs down from Spinale wended their way through the trees. There are some

good challenging reds over there and a superb black run. Already I could see the lights of the piste basher weaving to and fro across the slopes of the aptly named Spinale Direttissima - the top half is a great run but the chilling bottom half, recently re-named Schumacher's Wall, presents more of a challenge.

Profound silence surrounded me and I was reluctant to move. After a busy day guiding people this was the perfect end. Sighing, I pulled on my gloves, adjusted my pole straps and got ready to ski down. One last look. I could see the peak that is Monte Vigo and remembered our early morning runs across there on the interesting red, Genziana Alta, best done at that time before it gets busy with skiers on their way to Marileva and Folgarida. We had enjoyed some good skiing exploring these two smaller resorts and accepting the challenge of some great black runs.

Time to go. My skis swished and crackled on the crisp snow as I set off down Pradalago Facile a lovely blue which would take me down towards the town. But, when I reached the first junction I decided to turn onto Pradalago Diretta a super run through the trees that required a bit of thought. It was so

exhilarating, speeding down alone in the fading light. The sun, a red glowing ball, was sinking rapidly through a sky streaked with pink. It's warm glow was reflected in the summits above me. At the bottom of this run I swung right onto Collegamento Campiglio a connecting blue run which would take me right into the centre of town. In this resort all the main lifts are linked by connecting runs so it easy to move around the different ski areas.

I was now above the main square, Piazza Righi, and I could see the decorative lights sprinkled like frost on the buildings below. The final stretch was performed more quickly and less elegantly than I would have wished but by now the snow had a crust of ice. I landed with a clatter at the entrance to the Cinque Laghi lift whose cabins were suspended above my head, dormant for the night.

I was too late to catch the hotel shuttle at the bottom of this lift so I would have to walk into the town centre and get it from there. No problem, a chance to join the throngs of promenading Italians all meeting and greeting or sitting outside the popular Suisse Bar in Piazza Righi enjoying a drink. I shouldered my skis and walked into town. The atmosphere





Lorenzetti, where a little later I would enjoy a five course gourmet dinner before retiring to the cosy bar to relax and enjoy some live music as Stefano, the local music teacher, entertained us with his extensive repertoire and six different instruments. This superb hotel is situated just outside the town set against a backdrop of exceptional views of the famous Brenta Dolomites. It runs a regular courtesy shuttle bus to and from the lifts. Hotel Lorenzetti combines the comfort and informality of a family-run hotel with a so; phistication that entices guests back year after year. For further information go to: www.hotellorenzetti.com

MAYRHOFEN – SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

he resort of Mayrhofen lies close to the Hintertux glacier. With the glacier situated above the snowline, this Austrian town offers year-round skiing. The winter ski season in Mayrhofen starts on 27th November 2010.

The town is situated about 65km southeast of Innsbruck in the Zillertal region of the Tyrol and is located at the end of the resort-connecting Zillertalbahn. The Zillertalbahn, a train popular with locals and tourists alike, travels from Jenbach station and terminates in the resort of Mayrhofen.

Fly into Innsbruck and there is a short transfer by bus or car, an hour and a half at most, to Mayrhofen. On our two trips to Mayrhofen during the 2009/10 winter season this is the route we chose.

Alternatively, flights are available to Salzburg but transfers are three hours.

Mayrhofen itself consists of two ski areas, Penken and Ahorn. These resorts cover 159km of skiable piste located between 700 and 2500m above sea-level. Snow here is 100% guaranteed. In the unlikely event of little or no natural snow there are 135 snow cannons throughout the resort to make sure that you can always enjoy the wide range of slopes here.

The area of Penken is linked to the villages of Finkenberg, Lanersbach and Schwendau giving you plenty of terrain to explore. Queues can be large at the Penkenbahn in the morning. Locals travel by bus, which is free with your ski pass, to the next village of Schwendau. Once there you are more likely to avoid long queues by using the Horbergbahn lift. Remember to check weather conditions if you are skiing between villages. We had to travel down the mountain using the Horbergbahn after lifts were closed early. This was not a problem for us as but if you need to get back to pick up those in ski-school this could be an issue.

Although on our first trip we barely

covered the piste available, if 159km is not enough skiing for you then why not enjoy the full range that the Zillertal Superski Pass allows. The Zillertal offers 625km of piste to ensure you are never bored. You never have to ski the same run twice!

Mayrhofen offers great skiing for all levels as was sampled by the differing skiers in our group. There are dedicated ski schools catering well for children up to the more mature skiers. Areas are set aside for novices far enough from the paths of the more manic although still within easy reach. For the children in ski school there are fun toys and obstacles.

Mayrhofen offers many cruising blue runs and wide open reds allowing plenty of space for perfecting those carving turns. The wide nature of the pistes means there is no feeling of being crowded.

For the more advanced out there Mayrhofen does hold some steeper red runs. These can be a bit of a challenge if the snow conditions are tending to the icier side. However, they should not pose too difficult a challenge, even if the conditions aren't quite perfect. There are a few trickier blacks for those of you who are a little more daring.

For the more daring, give the Harikiri a try. This slope is not for the fainthearted with an incline of 78%! For most, just seeing it from the chairlift is enough.

The Vans Penken Terrain Park is worth a look for aspiring freestyle champions. This is the park where snowboarder Thomas "Beckna" Eberharter learnt his trade (if you're lucky he may even serve you dinner at his family's restaurant, the Pension Eberharter). There are different size kickers and rails so whatever your ability you can enjoy the park.

The Ahorn is slightly disappointing. The pistes up here are beautiful and sundrenched. The runs are beautifully groomed and wide open but there just is not much skiing to be done up here. If you have a late flight it might be worth purchasing a half-day pass if you are still aching to hit the white stuff.

The ride up to the Ahorn is incredible. The lift is the largest in Austria with a capacity of 160. It takes 6 minutes to get 1300 altimeters and is well worth it for the view alone.

When at the top of the Ahorn you will find the fabulous White Lounge Igloo. It is purpose built every year. Why not stay the night in one of their exquisitely carved ice rooms? Or, if cocktails are more your scene, stay for an après-ski drink. While sipping on your cosmopolitans you can enjoy the beautiful scenes of the Austrian Tyrol from the many deckchairs surrounding the igloo.

Mayrhofen town contains the usual aprèsski bars playing the latest music alongside some old classics. If you are looking for something a little more "local" there are small bars where you can indulge in a few Schnapps.

Accommodation is varied in Mayrhofen. We stayed at a Snow House by the train station. It was a slight walk to the Penkenbahn but buses were plentiful and free with the ski pass. Alternatively, there are beautiful hotels, some originally built in the 17th Century and with great restaurants serving traditional Austrian meals.

The annual Snowbombing festival livens up the town. This season it is being held from 4th-9th April 2011. Headliners are The Prodigy. If this is your style it's well worth a look. If not and you just fancy heading to the bars the streets and bars come alive with a fantastic atmosphere. If you're at the airport you may be lucky enough, as we were, to spot Fatboy Slim embarking on his private jet! For those of us not able to travel in his style, there are several Snowbombing travel and accommodation packages available.

Whatever your reasons for travelling to Mayrhofen you won't be disappointed. From great food to even better skiing this resort has something to offer for everyone.



MONEY AVAILABLE TO GET CHILDREN SKIING

Applications for the Ski Club of Great Britain schools bursary is now open

Secondary schools are being invited to apply for a bursary of £500 each from the Thomas Lang Schools Bursary scheme, set up by the Ski Club of Great Britain.

Schools can use the bursary to give students who may not have had the chance before, the opportunity to try snowsports. Typically the bursary will fund a place for a child on a school ski trip, a class outing to a UK snow slope or to help to buy clothing and ski accessories for children who need financial support.

"Being able to give people the chance to get out on snow is an important part of why the Ski Club exists. Even if we give one child the chance to experience the thrill of skiing or snowboarding, this is part way to our mission of getting more people into the sport." Said Caroline Stuart Taylor, Chief Executive of the Ski Club

Founded in 2007, the Bursary award scheme was set up by the Ski Club of Great Britain to encourage and help children to discover the magic of skiing. The money was left to the Ski Club by member Thomas Lang when he died.

Schools can apply online and they will automatically be placed into a pool of entries. Six schools will then be drawn at random and asked to submit their reasons for applying for the money. The six schools that receive the bursary are required to write a report about how the money was used.

THE SCHOOL SPORTS PARTNERSHIP CONFERENCE 2010

SNOWSPORT ENGLAND GRAND PRIX SERIES

From Norfolk to Sunderland via Pendle, Chill Factor and Hemel the Aosta Valley sponsored 2010 Snowsport England Grand Prix series again delivered a summer of exhilarating ski racing.

Beginning the season at Norfolk's fantastic facility even the dark grey skies overhead and chilly wind couldn't dampen the action on the hill as home slope favourites Sophie Skipper and Michael Molloy held off a number of stern challenges from further afield. Skipper did enough to push Alex Bullock and Charlotte Shrimpton into the minor podium positions in the ladies event whilst Molloy held off the expected challenge from runner up Andrew Watson and a fantastic challenge from 1st year junior Shaun Blythe in the male event.

At the end of May the series transported up the M6 to a traditionally damp and cold Pendle. In a race seriously affected by low numbers specifically due to a combination of the beginning of school examination period and the re-focussing of many racers sights onto indoor only racing Charlotte Gould and Gerard Flahive claimed event victories albeit in entirely different circumstances. With Gould utterly dominating the ladies race Emily Goddard and Stephanie Davies were left to claim the minor overall placings. In contrast, Flahive's refusal to accept defeat despite a horrific gust of head-wind on his first run was dutifully rewarded as midway leader Andrew Watson suffered a similar fate on run 2. Elsewhere Sam Stephens proved too good for the rest of the males to claim an overall 3rd.

From Pendle the series moved a few miles down the M61 into the spankingly plush surroundings at Chill Factor (we'll give the 'e' a miss). With a start list substantially bolstered by the return to racing from the indoor only athletes, the end of the exam season and containing a significant number of masters' racers it was the Pendle old hands of Joanna Ryding and Brad Morgan who eventually prevailed. In truth both athletes looked head and shoulders above their piers, both triumphing by over a full second. In the ladies Emily Whitelock and Beth Widdup claimed 2nd & 3rd respectively whist Scott McWhirter and Callum Henderson followed suit in the male event.

In mid July, Sunderland 's Silksworth complex played host to the final dendix and penultimate race of the series. Again with the sunshine conspicuous by its absence Charlotte Gould seized the initiative in the ladies race with a blistering first run that provided her with the opportunity to add a safe-ish afternoon run and still claim the victory. As with the Norfolk event earlier in the season the Telford duo of Charlotte Shrimpton and Alex Bullock fought out the other podium places to leave the ladies event with a Telford 1-2-3. In the male race amid the now traditional carnage of dnf and dsq's David Hatcher proved every bit as reliable and resilient as he is fast to claim victory whilst Daniel Curtis and Andrew Davies did more than enough to follow Hatcher onto the podium.

And so to Hemel and the final event of the series. With everything still to fight for and the start list full of quality racers it was always going deliver event winners of the highest calibre. And so it proved as Joanna Ryding again dominated the ladies race, once more posting an overall winning time in excess of a second in front of every other female racer, whilst Gerard Flahive won an altogether closer male event and in the process confirmed that he can challenge for summer race victories an any surface. In the ladies event Beth Widdup again proved Ryding's closest challenger with Jemima Barnes in 3rd whilst James Greenwood pushed Flahive all the way in claiming 2nd with James Knock finishing 3rd.

In the overall series standings Charlotte Shrimpton's impressive consistency proved the decisive factor amongst the ladies. In claiming substantial point hauls from each of the fived events Shrimpton did enough to claim the spoils ahead of Alexandra Bullock in 2nd and Emily Goddard 3rd.

This was a feat replicated by Andrew Davies, who like Shrimpton completed each event and kept adding significant point hauls in his quest for the competition title. Gerard Flahive's failure to register a score at Sunderland ensured that 2nd place was as far as his challenge went whilst Andrew Watson placed 3rd.

And so another intriguing series came to a conclusion with the series throwing up its usual array of high calibre winners, surprising newcomers and hard fought races. With next summer's series already well into the planning stage and the possibility of additional indoor races extending the series lets hope that the SSE GP series continues to deliver similar thrills and spills in 2011 and beyond.



22 SCHOOLS ATTEND INAUGURAL SURREY SKI CHAMPIONSHIPS

A Sunday in October saw the launch of the Surrey Schools Ski Championships at the Alpine Snowsports Centre at Aldershot. The race was supported by the Aosta Valley Tourist Board, HTS Ski Total, SkiBound snowsports for schools, and SkiClass; who all very kindly sponsored the day's racing and donated prizes.

Aimed at promoting the sport of ski racing and following the long running success of the annual Kent Schools Ski Championships, Surrey Schools Skiing was set up to run the new annual championship, open to pupils of all primary and secondary schools within the Surrey Education area. Schools enter racers as teams of 4 to take part in the team championships, or if not able to muster a team of 4, then racers can still represent their schools as individuals.

The event was a tremendous success, with 22 schools represented - from those locally based, such as All Hallows, Farnham Heath End and Weydon, to those as far afield as Danes Hill and Croydon High! Many of these schools had never entered a race team in any ski event anywhere before, therefore introducing many new schools and individuals to the sport.

In all 115 racers took part from across Surrey - covering School years 3 to 13 - all competing in the individual slalom races with 2 hard raced timed runs against the clock. These were followed by a 'fun', but still highly competitive, head-to-head, dual slalom race in the afternoon, which gave everyone a chance at a medal.

Reeds school from Cobham, lifted both the Overall and Senior (years 10 and over) boys trophies, with Royal Grammer School, Guildford second and Reeds B team third. In the Girls competition, Surbiton High stormed the competition, filling all three medal positions. Cranmore A, from Horsley, won the Mid (years 7,8,9) School Boys event and Surbition won the Mid School Girls.

The Primary School section had its own championship, with Cranmore B winning the boys Trophy, Danes Hill B second and Cranmore C third. In the Girls Competition, Danes Hill took the title, closely followed by two teams from Surbiton.

In the individual positions, fastest overall boy on the day was James Sieber (Reeds), hotly followed by Pete Davis (Woking College) and Chris Reader (Woolmer Hill) in third. In the Girls event, Overall Champion was Rebecca Pickup ((All Hallows), with Jenny Davies (Winston Churchill) second and Isabella Hathway (Farnham Heath End)

ALL ENGLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

With the hill at Norfolk's magnificent artificial ski facility absolutely swamped with racers looking for the perfect line during a hectic course inspection period it was clear that this was no ordinary day.

Indeed with over 200 athletes primed to do battle down a brace of championship testers on a bright and sunny September Saturday, even as early as course inspection it was clear that the athletes were going to provide the lucky spectators with a battle royale. Snowsport England's premier summer event, the All England Championships, was up for grabs and a substantial number of racers had genuine designs on lifting the old trophy.

In the ladies race Chatham starlet Emily Evans stamped an immediate authority upon the rest of the field with the arguable exceptions of elder sister Charlotte and Gloucester's zero pointed Charlotte Davies. Denied victory last summer by a mere 0.13s Evans always looked odds on to go one place better this year right from the moment she put her foot on the accelerator during the opening gates of Richard Breese's first course challenge.

The afternoon proved a markedly similar story with Evans again proving to be the class act of the field, negotiating Sally Bartlett's second run twister like a hot knife cutting through sun softened butter. Indeed with elder sibling Charlotte producing an equally impressive 2nd run and mid-point second placed Charlotte Davies perishing over the final throes of Bartlett's course the event not only had a new winner but had produced a Chatham and sisterly 1-2.

Elsewhere Charlotte Gould's impressive season continued with a fully deserved 3rd place overall, whilst Alice Hales took full advantage of 2nd run mistakes elsewhere to leapfrog into 4th with Alex Bullock claiming an excellent 5th.

In the male event, home town racer Shaun Blythe looked likely to spring a real surprise after impressively negotiating run 1 with an outstanding effort that was bettered only by senior warhorse David Hatcher. And with eight or nine racers all within striking distance of leader Hatcher after the morning skirmishes the afternoon event always looked likely to be a case of do or die. Nail it and you were in with a chance, ski it safe and any chance of victory would be long gone.

As the race came to its climax and each of the top ten males left the gate to begin their challenge it became fairly evident that good course inspection and even better technique was likely to prove decisive. Indeed, as others tried and failed an old name emerged from the chasing pack and leapt to the fore as Nick Robinson, Grand Prix winner at the very same slope only 15 months earlier, applied every ounce of his superb technique to break out of the pack and stake an early claim to the

This, however, was a claim that Andrew Davies quickly proved capable of bettering. One of the stars of the 2010 Grand Prix series Davies continued where he concluded the GP series with another fine display of strength and technique that whilst it wasn't quite as quick as Robinson it was still enough to nudge the Cardiff's athlete into the lead.

A lead that was somewhat short lived as Davies's Cardiff team mate and 2010 zero pointer Andrew Watson again reproduced the form he's shown for a quite a while, finding a couple of tenths on Davies and snatching the lead with only Blythe and Hatcher left to race. Blythe's impressive challenge faltered on Norfolk's weight shifting ridge and then Hatcher followed suit, the edge of his pants racer pushing his luck an ounce or two too far on the very same ridge and perishing into DNF territory. Blythe, however, at least managed to recover enough to ensure his name and fantastic first run time would be added to the final result.

In the categories Yasmin Cooper & Brandon Matthews triumphed in Children 1 whilst Antonia Pretty and Brodie Goddard-Jones ended victorious in Children 2. Emily Evans and James Grant proved too good for the rest of their piers in Junior 1 with Charlotte Evans and Andrew Watson prevailing in Junior 2. In the seniors Emily Goddard and James Greenwood took the honours whilst Carrie Walsh and Rob Hales won their respective Masters categories.

The successful switching of the minis race from an end of event space filler to a middle of the day spectacle provided our youngest racers with an event that their commitment and talents fully deserve.

Olivia Mitchell proved too good for the rest of the girls posting an aggregate time that was a full second quicker than runner up Grace Williams and Olivia Ward in 3rd.

In the male event Kristofer Berglindarson dominated proceedings producing a combined time that was almost a second and a half in front of runner up Ryan Llywarch and third placed Merrick Southall.

The day however no only belonged to winners Watson and Evans but also to the sport of dry slope summer racing. The Norfolk facility provides the event organisers with the perfect opportunity to showcase the sport and the talent within it to wonderful effect and with a start list brimming in both numbers and talent Evans and Watson can look back in the future and be sure that their victories were fully deserved.

Those who predict a rapid death to outdoor racing may need to rethink.

2010 SNOWSPORT ENGLAND CLUB NATIONAL SERIES

Long before the Snowsport England Club National series drew to an exciting conclusion on Southampton's south coast it had become a two way slug fest between the two most active clubs in the Central region.

In the blue corner came the Midland Ski Club. Spearheaded by the up front power of their heavyweight stable of male junior, senior and masters racers whilst being admirably bolstered by an army of child and female racers when the Club National series returned to it's traditional dendix surface they consistently positioned themselves in and around the winning line

And in the red corner was Telford Ski Club. In contrast, the Shropshire based club lacked the male firepower of their Central area counterparts on plastic but in fielding an array of competitive sub 35 point girls and the whole club having the ability to not only transfer but improve their competitiveness on indoor surfaces the Telford club more than held their own throughout the series.

Indeed following the calculations after Sunderland 's penultimate CN of 2010 a solitary single point split the two clubs at the top of the standings. From early in the summer Southampton's final CN event always looked likely to be a tense occasion and it proved very much to be so, as each racer from each club exited the Southampton start ramp looking to be the racer that would eventually make the difference in the competition.

In the end Telford's sheer depth of talent proved decisive as the Midland club deprived of one or two of their outdoor big hitters failed to hold their inspired rivals at bay, the Richard Breese coached club eventually

finding the knockout blow, taking the honours by 153 points to 150.

Aside from the Midland Area title fight, Pendle Ski Club continued their fine tradition in this competition comfortably matching the 3rd place they achieved in 2009. Deprived of a number of racers following a migration to the newly formed Chill Factore race team the North West's premier race team can be proud of their impressive achievement. In collecting substantial point hauls on both dendix and indoors the versatility in their racers skiing is a tribute to the quality of both racer and the coaching received at the club.

Best of the rest were Bromley Ski Club who book-ended the season with opening and closing day maximum point scores on the way to claiming 4th place overall – again quite an achievement for a club so geographically challenged by travelling time to and from their location.
